Well, everyone knows our member **Jack Kregas**, Jack is an accomplished author of numerous books of short stories and gripping fiction. His latest book, 'Shattered Innocence' deals with the horrifying statistics of thousands of teenage children disappearing every year, never to be seen again. Jack will present on the subject of designing an effective cover for your book.



Last month's guest speaker: Tess Merlin

In an earlier career, she was one of the first female Police officers in Queensland - only 27 of them in 1970! Tess not only talked about her work, but also about the enormous stress of being exposed to the proverbial 'Boy's club', whilst attending car crashes, burn victims and the constant Domestic Violence abuse victims. But that was not all...

'All due respect' is a wonderful expression. Because it doesn't specify how much respect is actually due. Could be none.



Tess got stalked.in private life. Her book 'Rank', written as "an autobiographical novel", i.e. fiction (change of location and names of people involved), outlines it all. "The great thing about writing in fiction is that you can change anything, including putting in an act of revenge" she said. Tess didn't just talk about her book, but also about how to get the basics of your intended work of art in place. "Talk to yourself". She

is currently working on her next book which is based on the town of Kingaroy. It's main theme is 'turning trauma into wisdom'... A tall order indeed!

Lily Arthur's book launch

At last month's meeting, at short notice, Lily jumped into the breach to present an 'Under the Spotlight' talk.

It's been really tough. 'Prisonoer of the State' is a complete rewrite of her original work 'Dirty Laundy', with the assistance of Megan Norris and Stacey King to get it on the right track. "I spent over \$30,000 last time" Lily said, "yet the book had not been circulated until 6 months after the launch". Megan wrote a feature article to appear in the Sydney Morning Herald's Good Weekend Magazine. That got the ball rolling alright!

An amazing career: "I had no further education after primary until age 47" she said. Then she joined a 'politically active' group of women to submit to a parliamentary enquiry. I started writing some 40 odd years ago, using on old typewriter my husband found on the

The Grahame Moore 2025 Challenge:

Yes, there will be three major competitions for our members this year. The subject of the first one is 'An Outback Yarn'. "Outback" is anywhere that is at least 1000 Km inland from the coast. (see above: this month's main speaker, Peter Frazer, has been engaged for this very topic).

The usual conditions apply:

- Less than one thousand words
- Only one entry per club member
- Fiction only
- No Artificial Intelligence (Chat GPT etc). *Not even a trace (yes, ve haff vays)*
- Genre is open, e.g. can be crime, romance or anything in between
- The story must not have been previously published or won a prize in another competition
- Authors retain copyright
- **Deadline: 30th March 2025**, no late entries, please.

The competition does not carry monetary prizes as last year, but certificates for best writers in each competition, given one month after closing date, then trophies for best overall writers for the year at our next Christmas Party.

Upcoming Writers Competitions

- a) OK, are you up to a challenge to **win \$5,000**? That is the **Sorrento Creative Writing Prize** 2025. Between 2,500 and 3,000 words. Deadline is 1st March 2025 and entry is free.
 And... ahm... you need to be 18 years old or over.
- b) The <u>Tom Grass Spirit of Adventure Prize</u>: Closes 31^{st} March -1,500 3,000 words. First prize £1,000 (yes, it's British), and yes, you can enter even if you don't live there.)

c) There are another 280 (last time I looked) competitions on <u>reedsy.com</u> – There must be one or two that suit you!
