Zimbabwean-born T.M. Clark crafts captivating literature spanning diverse cultures and wildlife, appealing to all ages; she has been nominated for a Queensland Literary Award, is an Australian Children's Book Council Notable, won a Claymore at Killer Nashville, and has been nominated for the Johnno Award, for outstanding services to the Queensland writing community, multiple times. When not killing her 'readers' and hiding their bodies (all in the name of literature,) she is the coordinator for the CYA Conference in Brisbane, Australia, which offers professional development opportunities to both established and

emerging writers and illustrators. Additionally, she co-hosts the Writers at Sea retreat. Tina Marie is as passionate about nurturing writers and collecting books for building libraries in Papua New Guinea as she is about saving the wildlife of the world, one rescue animal at a time.

Last month's speakers: Fiona Tarr, Megan Norris

'We wuz robbed!' I wrote in my meeting summary Well, with two speakers, both specialising in one or another form of crime, one would expect to learn stuff like how to put the modified Serenity Prayer into action (Lord, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to hide the bodies where nobody can find them... \mathfrak{S}



But, of course it was NOT about how to COMMIT a crime, but how to write, how to make it happen, and how to profit from it.

Our main speaker was acclaimed and bestselling Crime author **Fiona Tarr**, (centre in photo above, with Grahame Moore and Megan Norris) who, together with husband George, came all the way from Noosa. Now, if you thought that becoming a successful crime writer was a walk in the park... Fiona and George were for years running a family business (and still are). "I always wanted to write, but I wasn't an overnight success" she said, "I never called myself a 'real' writer until the current series was published. Her first 'real' novel presold... 17 copies. In 2014, her first work of the Opal Fields series was published. "But, by the time I had written the third book, I realised that preordered copies were dropping off. I didn't know how to make a book presentable, marketable, design cover etc" she said. "It doesn't matter how good a book you write, if you can't get it into people's hands... ... 20 books in the market place, but I couldn't sell them. I read a lot of books, picked up top 20 of the genre I wanted to write in. I learned how to escalate the story." The series is named 'The Opal Fields' with six volumes. The first volume of the 'Dawn Grave' series, 'Grave Regrets', is available now, and 'Grave Intent' will be released on 30th November. And herein lies one of her methods of success: Serialisation. (Of course, she is not the first one, think of authors

such as James Paterson who extended it to franchising his name and concept). And here is another one: When you order online, the first book (in Kindle version) is free of charge.

Megan Norris opened the meeting with an outline of the launching of Lily Arthur's book 'Prisoner of the State' (due for release in January). In support of this, Megan wrote a full feature article for the Sydney Morning Herald's 'Good Weekend' magazine (Saturday 21st September), which made the cover page!
