New Grahame Moore Challenge: An Outback Yarn

You have only to the end of this month to submit your entry! Yes, there will be three major competitions for our members this year. The subject of the first one is 'An Outback Yarn'. Definition of a 'Yarn'? Well, don't let truth to get in the way of a good story! After

last month's presentation by two "Outback specialist", you have no further excuses anymore. The genre is open, only few conditions apply:

- Less than one thousand words
- Only one entry per club member
- Fiction only
- No Artificial Intelligence (Chat GPT etc). Not even a trace (yes, ve haff vays)
- Genre is open, e.g. can be crime, romance or anything in between
- The story must not have been previously published or won a prize in another competition
- Authors retain copyright
- **Deadline:** 30th March 2025, no late entries, please. (It's actually 31st, but that is a Monday and I won't have the time nor the energy to compile all the entries for submission to the judges on a Monday... (3)

The competition does not carry monetary prizes as last year, but certificates for best writers in each competition, given one month after closing date, then trophies for best overall writers for the year at our next Christmas Party.

Upcoming Writers Competitions

- a) Furphy Literary Award max 5000 words, 1st prize \$15,000 and a LaTrobe University residency (subject to availability), 2nd prize \$3,000, 3rd prize \$2,000. Open now closing 30th April 2025. Theme: Australian Life in All its Diversity. Well, take a leaf out of Jim Dickson's exercise book (see above) and extend your 1000 word story to 5000. Somebody has to win it! To give you an idea of the level of sophisitication, you can read last year's winner click here.
- b) Writing for Children? <u>The Book Links website</u> says 'Competition for Adults' (i.e. most of us), but the story must be suitable for children of any age up to 15 years old. You need to hurry: entries close on **4**th **April.** 1500 words.
- c) There are another 280 (last time I looked) competitions on <u>reedsy.com</u> There must be one or two that suit you!

Looking forward to seeing you all for our March meeting, usual day, time and place: **third Thursday of the month, 20th March, 10:00 am**, ground floor meeting room of the Helensvale Library. Please try to be a little bit early so we can start on time – With three speakers, it's again going to run at a fast pace!
